Hiding From God

Monthly Theme

God has always loved us, even before we were born.

The Bible Lesson at a Glance

God creates Adam and Eve and surrounds them with gifts of love. One gift is expressed in negative terms: They are not to touch the tree of the knowledge of good and evil. Eve gives in to Satan's temptation and eats the fruit of the tree. Then she gives the fruit to Adam. When God comes, each blames someone else for their sin. God forgives them and tells them of His plan to deal with sin.

This is a lesson about grace.

Even though Adam and Eve disobeyed God, He did not abandon them. He would not wipe out the consequences of their sin, but He forgave them. God then told them of the greatest gift of all—the gift of salvation through one who would come to save them.

Teacher Enrichment

"God placed man under law, as an indispensable condition of his very existence. He was a subject of the divine government, and there can be no government without law. God might have created man without the power to transgress His law; He might have withheld the hand of Adam from touching the forbidden fruit; but in that case man would have been, not a free moral agent, but a mere automaton. Without freedom of choice, his obedience would not have been voluntary, but forced. There could have been no development of character. Such a course would have been contrary to God's plan in dealing with the inhabitants of other worlds. It would have been unworthy of man as an intelligent being, and would have sustained Satan's charge of God's arbitrary rule" (Patriarchs and Prophets, p. 49).

TEACHING THE LESSON

Welcome

Welcome students at the door. Ask how their week has been—what they are pleased/troubled about. Encourage them to share any experiences from last week's lesson study. Have them begin the readiness activity of your choice.



Readiness Activities

Select the activity most appropriate for your situation.

You Need:

- "invisible" or light-colored cotton thread
- two chairs

A. Invisible Bonds

Ask for two volunteers. Loosely tie the legs of two chairs, two sticks, or whatever is available together with the thread. Ask the children to pull the chairs (or other objects) to opposite ends of the room. The thread will break, and they will be able to move easily. Ask for two more volunteers. Repeat, but tie the chairs (or other objects) with five or six lengths of thread. Ask them to pull the chairs (or other objects) to opposite ends of the room. Depending on the thickness of the thread they may be able to do so.

Debriefing

Ask: Was it easy to pull the chairs apart? How easy was it to see the thread? (Difficult; could only see it because we were looking for it) How easy was it to break the chairs apart when they were tied with several threads? (More difficult) To the class: Could you see the thread linking them? (Easier because there were several strands) The thread is like sin. At first we do not see it, but as it gets a stronger hold on us, it is easier to see but harder to break free. We will learn more about the way sin gets hold of us in our lesson today. But God has a plan to help us. He will forgive us when we do wrong. Today's message is:

Say that with me.

B. No Place to Hide

Say: I am going to close my eyes and count to 20. During that time I want you to find somewhere to hide in this room. You are not to open cupboards or move anything. When you open your eyes, you should be able to see most of the children as there are few places to hide.

Debriefing

Ask: Who was able to hide? Who wasn't? Why? How did you feel when you wanted to hide but there was no good hiding place? Have you ever wanted to run away and hide? Why? In our lesson today two people did something wrong, and they tried to hide from God. But they couldn't. God still loved them, and He forgave them. He will forgive us, too, when we do wrong things. And that's what our message for today says:

Say that with me.

C. Changing Color

Show pictures of animals or insects that are good at hiding in their surroundings. If possible, have "stick" insects or other animals for the children to look at. Explain what they do to blend in with their background.

Debriefing

Ask: Why do (name animals) need to hide? Do you ever feel like you want to hide? Why? In today's story two people did something God had told them not to do, so they tried to hide from Him. But God still loved them and forgave them. And He will forgive us today when we do something wrong. That's what today's message is about:

Fellowship

Report the students' joys and sorrows (pleased and troubled) as reported to you at the door (as appropriate). Allow time for sharing experiences from last week's lesson study and review the memory verse. Acknowledge any birthdays, special events, or achievements. Give a special, warm greeting to all visitors.

Experiencing the Story

Invite a woman to read or tell the story from Eve's perspective. Have the children do a "thumbs up" when she says **God**, and give the thumbs down sign when she says **serpent** or **snake**.

Read or tell the story.

My name is Eve. I was the first woman **God** created. I lived with my husband, Adam, in a beautiful garden. During the day we worked in our garden home. We enjoyed taking care of the plants and animals. But the best part of the day was the evening. **God** would come and talk with us then. On the seventh day, the Sabbath, we spent the whole day with **God**. We never wanted Sabbath to end.

God gave us every tree in the garden for food except one tree—the tree of the knowledge of good and evil. He told us that we must never eat the fruit of that tree. I did not think much about it. There were so many other wonderful things to taste.

One day as I was walking through the garden I came to that tree. I recognized it at once. As I stood looking at it, a beautiful creature called a **serpent** began to talk to me. Later I learned that it was Satan. I certainly did not expect him to appear like that.

I was surprised. This **serpent** had a beautiful voice, soft and melodious. I was fascinated. Then it spoke to me! "Is it true that God has told you that you are not to eat from any tree in the garden?" he asked.

I know I should have run away. Instead I answered that **serpent: "God** told us we can eat from the other trees. However, this one—well, we are not even to touch it. If we do, we will die."

The **serpent** answered, "**God** is just afraid you will be as smart as He is. You will not die if you eat the fruit. You will become as wise as **God**."

I should have believed that **God** knew best. And I should have believed what He had told us. Instead, I reached out and touched the fruit.

Nothing happened.

Then I picked one and bit into it. It tasted good.

Still nothing happened.

So I picked another fruit and gave it to Adam. He recognized the fruit at once. When I explained what had happened, he took a bite. Immediately the beautiful, glowing clothing God had given us disappeared. We were naked! And we were ashamed! So we went to a fig tree and got some big leaves to make coverings for ourselves.

That evening, when we heard **God** walking through the garden, we hid from Him. We were so ashamed. But **God** came to us and asked why we were hiding.

Adam told him we were hiding because we were naked. **God** knew what we had done. He was so sad. He told us that we would have to leave the garden. And we would begin to get old, and eventually we would die.

Our life outside the garden would be hard. Weeds would grow. There would be thorns and thistles. Man would have to work hard to produce food. And everything else—the plants and animals that lived on earth—would die.

I cannot tell you how sad we were. But **God** told us about His plan to save us. He would send His Son into the world. His Son would take the blame for all the things we did wrong. He would die for us, so He could save us and restore us to live in **God's** presence.

Many years later Jesus came to this earth. He showed people how to live. And then He died for everyone's sinsmine and yours. Remember-God still loved us. He forgave our sins, and He will forgive your sins if you are truly sorry and ask Him to.

Someday soon Jesus will come again. He wants you to be with Him in heaven. Don't you want to be there?

Debriefing

Ask: What should Eve have done when she met the serpent? (Run away; leave that place.) Why did she give in to temptation? (She was persuaded by the snake. She stayed when she should have left.) Why did she not realize that the serpent was Satan? (He acted in a way that she was not expecting. He didn't look or talk like something evil.)

How did God react? (He was sad, but He had a plan ready, so that once again God and people would be able to be together.) God is still willing to forgive us when we are wrong. He wants us to make things right. If we are truly sorry, all we need to do is ask Him. Remember our message:

Memory Verse

Form three groups. Assign one phrase of the memory verse to each group. (See activity.) Have a helper assist each group as they study their phrase. Then have each group repeat their phrase in order. Switch phrases and repeat. Switch again and repeat. Repeat until all know the verse.

Group 1: "If we confess our sins, Group 2: he is faithful and just and will forgive us our sins

Group 3: and purify us from all unrighteousness" (1 John 1:9).

Bible Study

Say: God gave Adam and Eve-and us-the power to make choices. He knew that they (and we) might choose not to trust Him, and to disobey Him. He also made a plan to deal with our sins. Let's look at God's plan and see how God looks at sin when we ask Him to forgive us. Adults assist as needed. Allow time for discussion of each text.

Debriefing

Say: Even before He created the world, God had a plan to wipe out the effects of sin. We call it the plan of sal-

What happens when you ask God to forgive your sins? (He takes them away. It is as if they never existed.)

What do we need to do to receive forgiveness? (We need to confess or tell God what we have done and ask Him to forgive us. We also need to ask forgiveness of people we have wronged.) God forgives us when we do mean things to each other, and He wants us to forgive one another too. Remember our message:

Applying the Lesson

You Need:

- newspaper
- hand cream or lotion

A. Clean Hands and Heart

Give the children some hand cream or lotion to rub into their hands. Then give them a sheet of newspaper. Say: If your paper has reports of violence or something bad happening, crush it and throw it in the trash can. Allow time. Now look at your hands. What happened to them? They will be covered with newsprint. Let the children wash their hands.

Debriefing

Ask: What happened when we crushed the newspaper? How is that like our lives when we do wrong? (Our lives are like our hands. They are dirty with sin.)

What can we do to clean up our **lives?** (We can ask God to forgive us.)

What does God do with our sins when we ask for forgiveness? (He takes them away. He doesn't even remember them.) Remember our message:

B. Filling in the

Give each child a small block of wood and a nail. Help them to hammer the nail into the wood and then pull the nail out.

You Need:

- small block of wood per child
- nails
- claw hammer for every five children

Debriefing

Say: When we do something wrong, it is like hammering a nail in a nice piece of wood. When we say we are sorry, it is like taking the nail out of the wood. Is the wood the same after you have pulled the nail out? (No, there is a hole in it.)

When we ask God to forgive us, He forgives and forgets about our sin. Sometimes there are hurts that need to be taken care of. We may need to say sorry to others as well.

Sin makes holes in our lives that are hard to fill. Let's ask God to help us not to do things that will hurt ourselves and others. Gather the children in a circle and pray for help to avoid hurting others.

Let's say our message together:

Sharing the Lesson

Heart **Bookmark**

In advance, prepare a red heart and a white heart for each child. (See page 141.) Give each child a red heart and a white heart.

You Need:

- · red and white cardstock hearts (see p. 141)
- glue
- markers

Glue the hearts together along one side. When the glue is dry, the heart can be used as a bookmark to slip over the corner of a page.

Help the children write Isaiah 1:18, KJV, on the white heart. ("Come now, let us reason together," says the Lord. "Though your sins are like scarlet, they shall be as white as snow.")

Divide the children into pairs and have them explain to each other what happens when we sin and how God can make our hearts clean again.

You may wish to have each child make two bookmarks, one to share and one to keep.

Debriefing

Ask: When is our heart like the red heart? (When we do wrong, sin, disobey)

How can we change the red heart into a white one? (Only by telling God what we have done wrong and asking forgiveness of God and anyone we have hurt.)

We can be thankful that God is always willing to forgive our sins. Take your heart bookmark home and give it to someone today. Tell them how God always loves us and wants to forgive us when we do wrong.

Let's remember our message. It will remind us of God's love. Say it with me.

Closing

Invite the children to stand in a circle and sing "Into My Heart" (Sing for Joy, no. 125). Follow with a prayer thanking God for always being with us and for forgiving us.

Hiding From God

Memory Verse

The Message

God still loves us and will forgive us if we are truly sorry when we do something wrong. Have you ever done something wrong and been afraid to say that you did? Adam and Eve must have felt that way. It probably happened like this . . .

Adam and Eve were happy in their garden home. The best part of the day was the evening, when God often came and talked with them face to face. On the seventh day, Sabbath, they spent the whole day with God. They probably never wanted Sabbath to end.

God told them to enjoy every tree in the garden, except one tree—the tree of the knowledge of good and evil. He said: "You must never eat the fruit. If you do, you will surely die."

One day Eve was walking through the garden and came near the tree. As she looked at it, a beautiful creature, a serpent, began to talk to her. "Is it true that God has told you that you can't eat from any tree in this garden?" the serpent asked.

Eve knew she should go away from that place, but she didn't. Instead, she answered the snake: "God told us we can eat from all the trees in the garden—except this one. We are not to eat its fruit. We are not even to touch it! If we do, we will die."

The snake answered, "You won't die. You will be as smart as God is! Eating the fruit will make you wise."

Eve reached out and touched the fruit. Nothing happened. Then she took some fruit and bit into it. It tasted good. She picked more and gave it to Adam. When he knew Eve had eaten some, he ate some too.

As soon as Adam took a bite something happened to them. They realized that they were naked! They were ashamed—and afraid. They knew

they had done wrong. They ran to a fig tree and used its leaves to cover themselves.

That evening, when they heard God walking through the garden, they hid. They were ashamed to meet Him. When God found them, He asked: "Why were you hiding?"

"We heard You in the garden," Adam told God. "And we were afraid."

God knew what they had done, and He was sad. They would have to face the consequences. He told them that they would have to leave the beautiful garden. They would begin to get old and eventually die. Life outside the garden would be hard. Weeds would grow. There would be thorns. They would have to work hard to grow their food. And everything else would die too—the plants and the animals.

Even though Adam and Eve had chosen to disobey Him, God did not leave them alone. He told them about His plan to make things right. He would send His Son into the world. His Son would die and take the blame for all the things they did wrong.

Adam and Eve were very sad and very sorry for what they had done.

God forgave Adam and Eve for disobeying Him. He will forgive you, too,



when you do wrong, if you ask Him, and if you are really sorry. He wants to help you do what is right. And He wants you to be ready to go to heaven when Jesus comes again.

Daily Activities

Sabbath

- If possible, go to a lovely garden with your family and look at the beautiful things God has made. As you walk, discuss what you think the Garden of Eden looked like. Play "I spy" by saying "I spy something God made on the (name a day of Creation)."
- When you get home, draw a circle for the center of a flower. Draw and cut out a petal for each memory verse word and write the words on them. Arrange the petals around the center with the words in the right order. Use this to help you learn the memory verse and practice it every day.
- Sing about God's beautiful world and thank Him for making beautiful things.

Sunday

- During worship read and discuss Genesis 2:8, 9, 16, 17. Read about another tree in Revelation 22:1, 2. What is special about it? Draw a picture of the two trees.
- Find out what a fig leaf looks like. What are the largest leaves on the trees near where you live?
- Hold a piece of paper against a tree trunk. Rub a crayon on the paper. What do you see?
- Sing songs of praise and thank God for trees.

Monday

• Read and discuss Genesis 3:1-7 during worship. What did you learn about the fruit of the tree of the knowledge of good and evil? Talk about ways to say no when you are tempted to do something wrong. Say your memory verse together. Thank God for helping you to do what is right and for forgiving you when you do something wrong.

Tuesday

- Read and discuss Genesis 3:8-18 with your
- Ask about snakes in your country. Where

- do they live? What do they eat? Are any poisonous? It is believed that the serpent in Eden was very beautiful and looked different than snakes today.
- Play a short game of hide-and-seek with your family. Then thank God that you do not need to hide from Him when you do things that are wrong.

Wednesday

- For family worship, read and discuss Genesis 3:23, 24. What happened to Adam and Eve after they sinned?
- Ask someone to stand outside a closed door for a few minutes. Ask: What does it feel like to be shut out? What do you think Adam and Eve thought about being shut out from their garden home? Even though Adam and Eve could not go back into the garden, God had a plan. What was it? Is that same plan for you and your family?
- Sing songs of praise for God's plan, then thank Him for it.

Thursday

- For supper tonight, share some fruit salad with your family. Before worship, get some cotton and color it red. (Try a little food coloring.)
- During worship, read Isaiah 1:18 together. What does it mean? Use the cotton to explain the verse to your family.
- Say the memory verse together. Thank God for making us clean when we ask for forgiveness.

Friday

- During worship, review the story and act it out with your family. Remember, God forgave Adam and Eve. Say the memory verse for your family, then say it together. Who needs God's forgiveness? Do you need to ask for forgiveness to anyone in your family? If so, do it now.
- Sing "Alleluia" (Sing for Joy, no. 16), then invite God to be with you on His special day. Thank Him for telling about His plans in the Bible.
