

powertext

"Today in the town of David a Savior has been born to you; he is the Messiah, the Lord" (Luke 2:11, NIV).

What was something you studied in school that was particularly difficult to understand? And then, one day, a friend or a special teacher explained it so clearly that you could never forget it? That is what happened when God the Son became a human baby and came to live among us to help us better understand the love of God.

Jesus was born as a human being to help us understand God's character of love.

t was nighttime. All was quiet. A gentle breeze blew across the fields where sheep were grazing. Stars shone brightly in the sky. Only the voices of a few shepherds could be heard as they talked of their hope in the coming Messiah.

With deep interest they recalled the words of the prophets about the promised King who would sit on the throne of David. It seemed that the time was near, according to the prophecies found in the Holy Scriptures. The shepherds continued talking with intense anticipation about the important event that was about to happen soon. They were sure that it wouldn't be long before God would send the Messiah to free them from the Roman oppression. They were hoping that the Messiah would take charge and save them from their enemies. Once again they earnestly raised their hearts to God in prayer for the promised Messiah.

But suddenly their talk was interrupted as the night sky began to glow around them—a glow so bright that the entire field seemed to come alive with a strange and beautiful light. They were terrified as an angel suddenly appeared before them and spoke: "Do not be afraid. I bring you good news that will cause great joy for all the

THINK Why was Jesus circumcised and why was He presented to God at the Temple? See Leviticus 12:1–8; Exodus 13:2, 12, 13; and Numbers 18:15, 16.

REVIEW Review the power text.

PRAY Thank God that we are all His special sons and daughters.

As soon as the angel had spoken, another sound filled the air. It was the most beautiful music they had ever heard. "Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on earth peace to those on whom his favor rests," the voices sang (verse 14, NIV). A throng of angels had come to share in telling the good news of Jesus' birth.

Suddenly the light disappeared as quickly as it had come. Once again, all was quiet and dark. The shepherds, at first stunned, began to speak all at once. Could it be? What could that mean? The city of David? That was Bethlehem! With one accord they decided to go to Bethlehem to see the Child that the angel had told them about. Quickly they made their way to find the special Baby.

When the shepherds arrived at Bethlehem, they soon found Mary, Joseph, and Jesus, just as the angel had told them. What a sight! There in an animal shelter, in a feeding trough stuffed with hay, lay the most precious Baby ever to be born. When they saw Jesus, they could hardly contain their joy.

The next morning they spread the word throughout the town. The shepherds' announcement, brought with great enthusiasm, drew the attention and interest of the people. Everyone who heard the report of the shepherds was moved and pondered in amazement the significance of the marvelous news.

PRAY Praise God for being willing to come to us in the form of a helpless human baby.


READ Read Luke 1:46-55.
